Child Safeguarding Statement



Barnaderg National School is a primary school providing primary education to pupils from Junior Infants to Sixth Class.

In accordance with the requirements of the Children First Act 2015, Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children 2017, the Addendum to Children First (2019), the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools 2017 and Tusla Guidance on the preparation of Child Safeguarding Statements, the Board of Management of Barnaderg National School has agreed the Child Safeguarding Statement set out in this document.

- The Board of Management has adopted and will implement fully and without modification the Department's Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post Primary Schools 2017 as part of this overall Child Safeguarding Statement
- 2 The Designated Liaison Person (DLP) is John Henry Flattery.
- 3 The Deputy Designated Liaison Person (Deputy DLP) is Anne Marie Doyle.
- The Board of Management recognises that child protection and welfare considerations permeate all aspects of school life and must be reflected in all of the school's policies, procedures, practices and activities. In its policies, procedures, practices and activities, the school will adhere to the following principles of best practice in child protection and welfare:

The school will:

- recognise that the protection and welfare of children is of paramount importance, regardless of all other considerations;
- fully comply with its statutory obligations under the Children First Act 2015 and other relevant legislation relating to the protection and welfare of children;
- fully co-operate with the relevant statutory authorities in relation to child protection and welfare matters;
- adopt safe practices to minimise the possibility of harm or accidents happening to children and protect
 workers from the necessity to take unnecessary risks that may leave themselves open to accusations of abuse
 or neglect;
- develop a practice of openness with parents and encourage parental involvement in the education of their children; and
- fully respect confidentiality requirements in dealing with child protection matters.

The school will also adhere to the above principles in relation to any adult pupil with a special vulnerability.

- 5 The following procedures/measures are in place:
 - In relation to any member of staff who is the subject of any investigation (howsoever described) in respect of any act, omission or circumstance in respect of a child attending the school, the school adheres to the relevant procedures set out in Chapter 7 of the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017 and to the relevant agreed disciplinary procedures for school staff which are published on the DE website.
 - In relation to the selection or recruitment of staff and their suitability to work with children, the school adheres to the statutory vetting requirements of the National Vetting Bureau (Children and Vulnerable Persons) Acts 2012 to 2016 and to the wider duty of care guidance set out in relevant Garda vetting and recruitment circulars published by the Department of Education and available on the DE website.

- In relation to the provision of information and, where necessary, instruction and training, to staff in respect of the identification of the occurrence of harm (as defined in the 2015 Act) the school-
 - > Has provided each member of staff with a copy of the school's Child Safeguarding Statement
 - Ensures all new staff are provided with a copy of the school's Child Safeguarding Statement
 - > Encourages staff to avail of relevant training
 - > Encourages Board of Management members to avail of relevant training
 - > The Board of Management maintains records of all staff and Board member training
- In relation to reporting of child protection concerns to Tusla, all school personnel are required to adhere to the procedures set out in the Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017, including in the case of registered teachers, those in relation to mandated reporting under the Children First Act 2015.
- In this school the Board has appointed the abovenamed DLP as the "relevant person" (as defined in the Children First Act 2015) to be the first point of contact in respect of the schools child safeguarding statement.
- All registered teachers employed by the school are mandated persons under the Children First Act 2015.
- In accordance with the Children First Act 2015 and the Addendum to Children First (2019), the Board has carried out an assessment of any potential for harm to a child while attending the school or participating in school activities. A written assessment setting out the areas of risk identified and the school's procedures for managing those risks is included with the Child Safeguarding Statement.
- The various procedures referred to in this Statement can be accessed via the school's website, the DE website or will be made available on request by the school.

Child Safeguarding Risk Assessment

Written Assessment of Risk of Barnaderg National School

In accordance with section 11 of the Children First Act 2015 and with the requirements of Chapter 8 of the *Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017*, the following is the Written Risk Assessment of Barnaderg National School.

2. The school has identified the following risk of harm in respect of its activities -

- See 1 above. Risk of children arriving to school before supervision starts. Risk of collection of pupils by adults not listed as guardians/authorised contacts. Risk of pupils not being collected at dismissal time. Risk of children re-entering the school building to collect forgotten books, sports gear etc.
- See 2 above. Risk of child being harmed when using toilets during break times. Risk of child being harmed if they re-enter the school during recreation to get coat/other item from classroom. Risk of child being harmed if parent requests that a child stay inside due to illness. Risk of inappropriate play between pupils. Risk of bullying during recreation break. Risk of harm during wet days if indoor supervision is inadequate.
- See 6 above. Risk of harm by a member of staff of another organisation or other person. Risk of harm while administering first aid/attending to injuries. Risk of harm due to inadequate supervision in changing areas/toilets. Risk of harm due to inadequate supervision of substitute players/supporters etc.
- See 8 above. Risk of child being harmed by a member of school personnel, by another child or by a volunteer or visitor to the school.
- See 10 above. Risk of child being harmed by volunteer or visitor to the sports day. Risk of harm due to children inappropriately accessing/using computers, social media, phones and other devices while at school. Risk of harm due to inappropriate relationship/communications between child and another child or adult.
- See 14 above. Risk of child being harmed due to inappropriate use of physical contact to attend to sensory or other needs.
- See 15 above. Risk of child being harmed due to inappropriate restraint being used.
- See 18 above. Risk of child being harmed by pupils passing on inappropriate information to younger children or children who have not participated in the programme.
- See 21, 22, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 32 & 33 above. Risk of harm to child if *Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017* and Garda vetting legislation are not complied with in full.
- See 36 above. Risk of harm to child due to presence of adults in school building to accompany pre-school children to and from the pre-school facility.

In addition to the risks identified above a combination of the following risks apply in varying degrees to all activities undertaken by the school and its personnel.

- Risk of harm not being recognised by school personnel
- Risk of harm not being reported properly and promptly by school personnel
- Risk of child being harmed in the school by a member of school personnel
- Risk of child being harmed in the school by another child
- Risk of child being harmed in the school by volunteer or visitor to the school
- Risk of child being harmed by a member of school personnel, a member of staff of another organisation or other person while child participating in out of school activities e.g. school trip, swimming lessons
- Risk of harm due to bullying of child

- Risk of harm due to inadequate supervision of children in school
- Risk of harm due to inadequate supervision of children while attending out of school activities
- Risk of harm due to inappropriate relationship/communications between child and another child or adult
- Risk of harm due to children inappropriately accessing/using computers, social media, phones and other devices while at school
- Risk of harm to children with SEN who have particular vulnerabilities
- Risk of harm to child while a child is receiving intimate care
- Risk of harm in one-to-one teaching
- Risk of harm caused by member of school personnel communicating with pupils in appropriate manner via social media, texting, digital device or other manner
- Risk of harm caused by member of school personnel accessing/circulating inappropriate material via social media, texting, digital device or other manner

- School Personnel are required to adhere to the *Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017* and all registered teaching staff are required to adhere to the *Children First Act 2015*
- The school implements in full the Stay Safe Programme
- The school implements in full the SPHE curriculum
- The school has an Anti-Bullying Policy which fully adheres to the requirements of the Department's *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools*
- The school has a Supervision Policy to ensure appropriate supervision of children during, assembly, dismissal and breaks and in respect of specific areas such as toilets, changing rooms etc.
- The school has a School Tours and Excursions Policy in place
- The school has a Swimming Policy in place
- The school has a Fire Drill and Evacuation Policy in place
- The school has a Safety Statement in place. It includes a policy on the administration of medicines and medication.
- The school adheres to the requirements of the Garda vetting legislation and relevant DES circulars in relation to recruitment and Garda vetting
- The school complies with the agreed disciplinary procedures for teaching staff
- The school has a Special Educational Needs policy
- The school has a Policy for Physical Intervention with Pupils
- The school has an intimate care policy/plan in respect of students who require such care
- The school has in place a Code of Behaviour for pupils
- The school has in place an Internet Acceptable Use Policy in respect of usage of ICT by pupils

- The school has in place a Critical Incident Management Plan
- The school has in place a policy and procedures for the use of external sports coaches
- The school has in place Guidelines for Student Teachers and Others Working in Barnaderg National School
- The school complies with the agreed disciplinary procedures for teaching staff.
- All external coaches, student teachers, adults on work experience and students on work experience will be Garda vetted and will not have unsupervised access to pupils.
- Student teachers in their final university year who meet the Teaching Council requirements for Garda vetting and teaching qualifications may be employed as substitute teachers.

Development Section

- The school will develop codes of conduct for school personnel (teaching and non-teaching staff)
- The school will develop a policy and procedures for the administration of First Aid. This will include our current Accident Policy.
- The school is in the process of updating the Internet Acceptable Use Policy to take account of school wifi and the advancement in smartphones and tablet devices.
- The school will develop a standalone policy and clear procedures on one-to-one teaching activities.
- The school will review the Supervision Policy with emphasis on recreation breaks on yard & field, movement breaks, children doing jobs/messages during school time.
- The school will review the School Tours and Excursions Policy with emphasis on sports trips, swimming lessons and changing arrangements.

Important Note: It should be noted that risk in the context of this risk assessment is the risk of "harm" as defined in the Children First Act 2015 and not general health and safety risk. The definition of harm is set out in Chapter 4 of the *Child Protection Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools 2017*

In undertaking this risk assessment, the board of management has endeavoured to identify as far as possible the risks of harm that are relevant to this school and to ensure that adequate procedures are in place to manage all risks identified. While it is not possible to foresee and remove all risk of harm, the school has in place the procedures listed in this risk assessment to manage and reduce risk to the greatest possible extent.

This Risk Assessment has been completed by the Board of Management on 23rd September 2020 and reviewed on 9th November 2021. It shall be reviewed as part of the school's annual review of its Child Safeguarding Statement.
